PUBLIC QUESTION No. 1

NEW JERSEY PUBLIC BUILDING
CONSTRUCTION BOND ISSUE.

Shall the act entitled "An act authorizing the creation of a debt of the State of New Jersey by issuance of bonds of the State in the sum of \$275,000,000.00 for public buildings, their construction, reconstruction, development, extension, improvement, equipment and facilities for health, education and welfare uses; providing the ways and means to pay the interest of said debt, not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$215,000,000.00, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof; and providing for the submission of this act to the people at a general election," be approved?

PUBLIC QUESTION No. 2

NEW JERSEY PUBLIC ROADS AND
HIGHWAYS BOND ISSUE.

Shall the act entitled "An act authorizing the creation of a debt of the State of New Jersey by issuance of bonds of the State in the sum of \$475,000,000.00 for the construction and improvement of public roads and highways, including the elimination of railroad crossings at road grade; to provide for State grants to assist municipalities and counties to construct and improve public roads and highways; providing the ways and means to pay the interest of said debt, not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$370,000,000.00, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof; and providing for the submission of this act to the people at a general election," be approved?

PUBLIC QUESTION No. 3
VETERANS' PROPERTY TAX CREDIT
AMENDMENT

Shall the amendment of Article VIII, Section I, paragraph 3 of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey granting an annual deduction not to exceed \$50.00 from the tax bill for taxes on real and personal property as therein provided of certain veterans and their widows instead of the \$500.00 exemption presently provided on the aggregate assessed valuation of such property, be approved?

PUBLIC QUESTION No. 4
AMENDMENT REDUCING VOTERS'
RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS

Shall Article II, paragraph 3 of the Constitution be amended to incorporate the following changes:

(a) Reduce the residence qualifications within the county, of citizens, from 60 to 40 days;

(b) Make adult citizens of the United States, residents of the State and county 40 days and not eligible to vote elsewhere, eligible to qualify and vote, in the county, for electors for President and Vice President of the United States, only, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide;

(c) Make registered voters, removing from State or county, who are not able to qualify to vote from new residence because of insufficient residence there, eligible to vote where registered in this State, for electors for President and Vice President of the United States only, by Presidential Elector Absentee Ballot, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide?

AGING CITIZENS' RESIDENCE TAX CREDIT
AMENDMENT

Shall the amendment of Article VIII, Section I, paragraph 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Jersey granting an annual deduction not to exceed \$80.00 from the tax bill for taxes on real property as therein provided of certain citizens and residents of this State of the age of 65 or more years instead of the \$800.00 exemption presently provided on the aggregate assessed valuation of such real property, be approved?

PUBLIC QUESTION No. 6

FARM LAND ASSESSMENT AMENDMENT

Shall the amendment of Article VII, Section I, paragraph 1, of the Constitution, agreed to by the Legislature, which permits land used in agriculture or horticulture to be valued for local tax purposes according to the value such land has for such use and which provides for the payment of additional taxes if such land is thereafter applied to nonagricultural or nonhorticultural use, be adopted?
